


SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED INFECTIONS (STIs) 2



Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) are diseases that can be passed from one person to another through sexual relations (including oral sex)

How does it spread?	What symptoms does it produce?	When do the symptoms appear?	How is it diagnosed?	When is the test done?	How is it treated?	Effectiveness of condom
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GENITAL HERPES

Skin-to-skin contact	Painful sores at the site of infection (in 40% of cases there are no symptoms)	If they do appear, this occurs from 2 to 21 days after the exposure to risk	Blood test or a sample taken with a cotton bud	The results of the sample taken with the cotton bud are reliable 12 days after the exposure to risk and the results of the blood test 3 months after.	Not curable but some medicines improve the symptoms of outbreaks	Bad
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GENITAL WARTS (HUMAN PAPILLOMAVIRUS)

Skin-to-skin contact	Non-painful swellings around the genitals or buttocks (often without symptoms)	If they do appear, this occurs from 1 to 8 months after the exposure to risk	Diagnosis usually involves visual inspection of the lesions. Follow-up may involve anal or vaginal smear tests	Upon the appearance of the symptoms described	Visible warts may be treated. Over 80% of genital warts get better on their own within 24 months after appearance	Bad. There is a vaccination that prevents infection caused by some types of the virus
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TRICHOMONIASIS

Semen and vaginal fluids	Vaginal secretions. Burning or pain upon urinating. Painful sexual relations	From 4 to 28 days after the exposure to risk	Analysis of a sample taken with a cotton bud	From 4 to 28 days after the exposure to risk	Cured with medicines	Good
